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A Letter from the Mayor

Hello everyone,

The weather has had some ups and downs. Thankfully we have had more of the upside. Hopefully that continues.

We have made a significant adjustment concerning the homes on Center Street. The original intention was for the development to mirror the existing homes built in the previous development. Included in this was a detached garage. As the developer had conversations with potential buyers, a consistent theme came out – requests for an attached garage. Doing this from the rear of the yard would be cumbersome, involving an attached breezeway, etc. Based on the requests, we are moving forward with attached front garages. The cost of the driveways that will need to be created will be paid for by the developer. The location of the driveways will be such so as no streetlight will have to be relocated and no buffalo box (water line valve access) will have to be relocated either. In conjunction with this change, the need for alley usage is nonexistent on the new homes. Therefore, we will be closing off the alley behind new homes. The alley will remain open behind the existing homes. The City owns fourteen feet of property in that alley. Ten feet will remain as an access easement for NIPSCO when needed (all NIPSCO poles on Center Street will eventually be in the alley). The other four feet is being vacated by the City and given to an individual that purchases the property. The garages in front and the extra footage in back dramatically increase the size of the backyard. In addition, a purchaser will be able to construct an eight foot fence along the back property line to create a greater buffer to the railroad tracks. I believe these changes will make these properties more inviting for families to purchase.

I will take this opportunity to welcome **Marty Wielgos** to the City of Whiting Staff. Mr. Wielgos is assuming the position of Utilities Director (Water & Sewer). Mr. Wielgos has an extensive resume, including thirteen years as CEO of the Hammond Sanitary District. I believe he will be an excellent addition for the City. As this article is being written, he is familiarizing himself with day to day operations. Assisting him in this effort is current Utilities Director **Tim Wajvoda**. Mr. Wajvoda assumed the position last summer with the retirement of **Paul Tumo**. Mr. Wajvoda will transfer this month to the IT Department to assume the position of Assistant IT Director. I wish both gentlemen well in their new assignments.

I am pleased to announce that the Whiting Police Department has joined the Northwest Regional SWAT Team. Fourteen communities participate in this program. The benefits of joining are numerous, and having additional resources available should a situation arise is a practical move. I consider joining this organization an additional layer of protection for our community. My compliments to **Chief John Sotello** for coordinating our efforts to join the program.

We are in the process of purchasing drones for our Police and Fire Departments. **Fire Chief Don Harbin** and Chief Sotello have both researched and witnessed demonstrations of the drones. The drones will be used for emergency situations, large social events, etc. They will provide useful information to our Police and Fire Departments as certain situations are monitored. Department personnel will be trained on operating and maintaining the drones. I thank both Chief Harbin and Chief Sotello for their research. This will be another useful tool to assist the Police and Fire Departments along with our community at large.

Recently the City of Whiting joined the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities Initiative. This organization was established in the 1990's by Mayor Daley of Chicago and the Mayor of Toronto at that time. The current president of the organization is the Mayor of Milwaukee. The presidency rotates every year between a Mayor in the United States and a Mayor in Canada. We join over 250 communities in both countries that border the St. Lawrence Seaway and the Great Lakes, including several of our neighboring communities. One of the main efforts of this group is coastal resilience. We still have a section on our shoreline that we would like to reinforce in the future (the old Gun Club area). By joining this organization, we will have access to services (engineering firms, grant applications) that potentially can save the City significant costs as we pursue this project.

The City posted on our website that beginning on March 18th, the removal of "dibs" from parking spaces and parkways would begin. We have been blessed with a mild winter, but that has not prevented the proliferation of items being placed out to reserve private parking on a public street. I understand the situations around Pierogi Fest or severe snow, but putting dibs out on a regular basis is unacceptable. My hope is to be able to create defined parking spots on some northside streets this year. This has worked to regulate parking in other parts of the City.

CCSJ Offers Free Soil Sampling

Last year, the Federated Metals site (at the corner of Indianapolis Blvd. & New York Ave.) was included on the Superfund list. At public meetings last fall, representatives from the EPA shared the extensive timeline related to testing and identifying local areas of concern.

Calumet College of St. Joseph, in collaboration with the Northern Lake County Environmental Partnership, will be able to immediately provide free soil sampling kits for residents who are concerned about the potential contamination of their property. This sampling is in no way affiliated with the EPA or any work they will do in the future.

We will hold an information session on Wednesday, April 17th, at **6pm** in **Room 200**. At this meeting, Whiting-Robertsdale residents will learn about how the testing is completed and how results are shared. Soil sampling kits will be available that evening. There is no charge for the kits or testing. Please join us.

An Occluded View

As a community, we have always taken pride in having quaint little businesses, especially in Downtown Whiting. And one aspect of that downtown is being able to see into the stores and businesses. Now, window shopping is nothing new, and it's designed to prompt people to see what is for sale, how busy things are, or if it's a restaurant, if there is seating available. It is the subject of much lore and song lyrics about what makes a downtown. When people come to our community, we like to boast that we have a viable downtown with little shops and restaurants. Part of the attraction of our downtown are the windows of stores like Suncatchers, Just Little Things, Junkyard, and Mind Benders. On a Friday or Saturday evening, you can see people driving down 119th Street looking to see if there is seating at Beggars, Standard Taproom, Winey Beach, Bulldog, Burrito Stop, Richie's Deli, Sunrise, Dos Sabores, Center Lounge, Taco Dive, and Grindhouse. It is also part of the experience to sit in those establishments and look out at 119th Street to see who is walking or driving by, enjoying that downtown atmosphere. We value the impact of business windows and the overall atmosphere that they create. We even give an annual award at Christmas for window decorating, as those decorations help to accentuate the overall experience of downtown.

Sometimes, windows are covered temporarily by paper. This is a sign of renovation or a new business, such as the situation with the storefront where Buzzin' Barbeque was (it moved in with Richie's Deli) and I am told that a new business will open there shortly. That also applies to the building next to Hobson and Scott. While covered/papered windows are a rite of passage and commonplace, our downtown is plagued with windows that cannot be seen through and detract from the overall appearance and atmosphere.

Let me give you some glaring (no pun intended) examples. For more than five years and possibly a lot longer, the windows of the former Hoosier Flower Shop at Oliver have been papered over. The paper is now stained and unattractive and there is no sign of improvement. The owners claim that they are planning on renovating the building and opening a business.

While that all sounds great, would it be that hard for the owner to at least change the stained paper to make it more attractive?

Brown paper doesn't garner the thought of an enchanting shopping area, or always indicate a coming business. The old Chase Bank Building is occupied by a rare book seller, but few would know it because after spending a significant amount of money on new windows, the openings are covered by brown craft paper. Oddly, the city required the owner to meet a number of standards for decorum, design, and manufacture of the replacement windows through its historical review process, but there was evidently no standard about how the windows would look once they were installed as they have been covered by brown paper for more than a year.

The windows on the buildings at the corner of LaPorte have been covered for a decade. While some of the coverings were signage promoting events and activities, most people recognize that the buildings are empty and in a condition that no one could locate a business in anyway. With or without signage, its three storefronts that are perennially vacant and add nothing to Downtown Whiting.

Sometimes, its not that the windows are papered over, but instead block or occlude views. Family Dollar is in business, but you can't see into the store since the windows are blocked by everything under the sun, including postings that are faded and unappealing. That might be a good thing, since the little portion of windows that you can see through are quite dirty and are in dire need of cleaning.

The building located in the former CVS Pharmacy building has taken the same approach by loading up the windows, making the store anything but inviting. I can understand adding drapes that are semi-transparent or blinds to block out the direct glare from the sun, but installing opaque drapes so that one cannot see into the building defeats at least part of the reason for windows and being located in a walkable downtown area.

These conditions, or lack thereof, help to define our community. We want our businesses and storefronts to be attractive and appealing, including storefronts that are empty. The problem is that making these stores look more attractive really depends on the owners and not the City.

Oh, and if you think I forgot about businesses in Robertsdale, I did not; that will be part of next month's column.

As winter ends and spring begins, we will be changing our hours for the clothing room at Faith Baptist Church in Whiting. **Beginning April 1st**, we will be


open **Tuesdays**, **9am-3pm**. We have been very busy this year, which makes me extremely happy. We have given away over 200 coats this winter and many items of clothing.

Stewardship and caring are necessary to correct the imbalance in the human/earth equation. We have a duty – and the ability—to balance the equation.

The Saturday before Earth Day (Saturday, April 20th) is a perfect time to use your gifts for the betterment of our community. We are planning clean ups along Indianapolis Boulevard, Calumet Avenue, 119th Street and 121st Street. Starting time is 9am and we will continue until approximately 11am. A clean up of Whihala Beach begins at 10am and continues until early afternoon depending on the number of participants. During the week of May 6th, we will be celebrating Teachers Appreciation Week. We are very fortunate to have such a dedicated group of educators serving our students. Their efforts throughout the school year contribute to the success of our students and the district as a whole. The planning of our summer school programs and summer registration dates is underway. Due to current cost containment measures after the loss of our referendum, summer school will only be offered to 2nd/3rd grade Nathan Hale students needing reading remediation and all WHS students who are behind on course credits due to failing classes and are not on track to graduate on time. Due to current legislation recently passed, all 2nd and 3rd grade students not passing IREAD will need to attend summer school. Students will have (3) opportunities to pass the IREAD assessment prior to the end of 3rd grade. Students not passing will be considered for retention in 3rd grade.

Summer school programs for grades 2nd-3rd reading instruction will begin June 10th and end June 28th. Class hours will be 8:30 -11:30am each day. The WHS summer school program will begin on June 10th and end July 3rd. Classes for high school students will be 7:45-11:55am daily. Summer school is a great opportunity to bring students back on track. Letters to parents of all students required to attend summer school will be


going home this month. Please remember to check your child's grades and progress regularly using our RDS parent access website:

Even though we have experienced some funding challenges during the school year and will continue to face this moving forward, we are looking forward to finishing the '23/'24 school year strong. Next month, I will be sharing our cost containment plans in light of continued tax cap losses, decreasing enrollment, and loss of our referendum. Since 2019, we have experienced declining resident student enrollment in the School City of Whiting. We have lost 127 resident students during that time. We are not alone in seeing declining enrollment. According to a January 2024 study by the Indiana Chamber of Commerce Foundation and Ball State University, 75 percent of small school districts — those with less than 2,000 students experienced declining enrollment since 2014 and 60 percent of those districts had declines of 50 or more students.

We are also not replacing the students at the same rate that we graduate them each year. For example, in 2023, Whiting High School graduated 101 students in the spring, but we only enrolled 52 incoming kindergartners in the fall. It is fortunate for us that families outside of Whiting choose to enroll their children in our district as nonresident students so we can keep our enrollment as stable as possible. Unfortunately, costs of running a school district do not decrease when the student population does. As a strong school district always focused on our students and providing academic opportunities for all, we are continuing to work hard to ensure that every student is given the opportunity to achieve and experience success in the School City of Whiting.

We are optimistic as we are nearing the end of the '23/'24 school year and we know that our collective resilience and commitment to education will allow us to continue to work together to provide a bright future for our school community.





Frankie V's Bar & Grill

Nestled at the intersection of Calumet Avenue and 119th Street is **Frankie V's Bar & Grill**, a small but cozy restaurant and bar that greets those who are entering the confines of Robertsdale from Calumet Avenue, offering a place to sit back, rest, and take in the vibe of the community. It



is a venue with a quiet and charming atmosphere and is known to be a popular hangout spot - a neighborhood bar where, owner **Martina Krstic** says, "everyone does know your name."

Inhabiting the building that once housed the now closed Up For Grabs, Frankie V's first opened its doors in 2015, marking its ninth year in business. It wasn't until March of 2023 that Martina took over as Frankie V's new owner, so this past month she marked her one year anniversary of taking on the role. A regular customer before she purchased the bar, Frankie V's was once her local hangout.

"My favorite part of becoming the new owner and also working as a bartender is that I am getting to know the neighborhood and its people," Martina said, "I'm originally from Chicago and have only lived in the Whiting-Robertsdale area for seven years."

Martina, wearing several hats in her new role, also talked about her responsibilities as Frankie V's new owner, which include daily operations from food ordering to payroll. In between, she does marketing, special events, catering orders, and the many other things that an owner is responsible for. It's a job where Martina says she is still learning daily.



"Creating the specials board, greeting guests, and meeting guests are the best parts for sure," Martina said, "You can come meet me during my morning shifts, 11am-4:30pm, Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays!"

While the menu at Frankie V's is still in the process of being

finalized, some of their most popular menu items include their pizza, chicken Vesuvio sandwich, fried chicken, Italian beef sandwich, and grilled portabella mushroom appetizer. Martina also mentioned that Frankie V's had recently upgraded their bar stools and that the next projects in store include improvements to the exterior of the building consisting of painting, repair work, and a new awning.

"A lot of menu items are made in-house," Martina added, "like the Italian sausage, Italian beef, pizza dough, and tomato sauce. These items are made weekly. We also post daily specials on our Facebook page, which are not on the menu. Some of the special menu items are pork chops, meatloaf, deep dish pizza, prime rib, and pizza with fried chicken combos. 1ST DISTRICT NEWS

Hello readers. Spring is near and Little League signups are underway. Todays' article is a summary of Hammond news as described recently in the media, by the Mayor at

Council meetings, chamber luncheons, etc. Horseshoe Gaming revenue is declining with casinos now in Chicago and on I-94 in Gary. The city was receiving \$35,000,000 per year; exact numbers for 2023 have not been made available but projections indicate it will be less than \$26,000,000. As more casinos go up in the southern suburbs of Chicago, Hammond gaming revenue is likely to continue to plummet. The mayor reports that water has offset some of the loss; water revenue was 7 to 8 million per year and is now 22 million due in part to contracts with more Illinois communities.

Hammond Sanitary District is under new leadership. Congratulations to **Milan Kruszynski** who did an outstanding job as the Port Authority and Hammond Marina Director. Good luck in your new role at the Sanitary District. A rate increase is likely later this year to fund multimillion dollar projects mandated by the Federal Government.

New contracts have to be negotiated with police, fire, and teamsters this year to go into effect in 2025. Hammond is losing police staff to retirement and to the towns south and east that pay starting officers more than Hammond.

The West Lake rail project is on schedule to operate from Dyer to Hammond in 2025. Phase 1 of double tracking from Gary to Michigan City is almost complete, and double tracking is scheduled to start from Michigan City to South Bend.

The Hammond City Council passed a resolution asking state legislators' approval to pursue a 1% food and beverage tax (on top of the 7% state sales tax) on dine-in and take-out food and drinks sold at Hammond eateries and bars as soon as July 1. The Indiana House voted 67-29 to advance House

Bill 1121 to the Senate. If the Senate and Governor approve it, the bill would return to the Hammond Common Council for a vote. Money collected via this tax may only be used for the West Lake commuter rail project, downtown redevelopment, and expansion or improvement of the Hammond Sportsplex or Wolf Lake Pavilion. (NWI Times 01-31-2024).

Plans are in the works to create an industrial complex at 3-141st Street across from Hermits Little League. Potential environmental cleanup of the property should be addressed before allowing demolition of buildings or construction of new buildings.

Recently on Boy Scout Road, I noticed an official looking car with "surveyor" on it. I was told there was interest in putting multiple pipelines through the 1st District. I was unaware of this possibility and hope to have more information in the future. I recall several years ago Central and South Hammond experienced multiple pipeline leaks and breaks causing evacuations, odors, and closure of parts of Indianapolis Blvd., raising concerns related to health and safety risks and inconvenience to residents for months on end.

Years back I was approached to support warehouse development roughly in the same area bordering Sheffield Avenue and Boy Scout Road. I did not believe that kind of development was in the best interest of local residents given its proximity to Wolf Lake and increased truck traffic through the neighborhood. I am skeptical that pipelines and warehousing facilities adjacent to Wolf Lake will improve the quality of life to local residents or to the Wolf Lake surroundings.

Lastly, Hammond is seeking input from motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists to improve road safety in the city. An online survey is found at www.surveymonkey.com/r/VJZF6TC and is intended to help identify problem areas to reduce fatalities and serious injuries on Hammond roads (NWI-TIMES 03-04-2024). As many of you know, I and a fellow councilman were unsuccessful in getting stop signs at various locations recently, including a warning by the mayor that it would be vetoed if the ordinance passed. I encourage you to fill out the survey.

Whiting Code Enforcement

It does not matter if you own a house or apartment building, the responsibility of being a responsible owner is the same. You must clean up around your property. I will touch on an ordinance that is very important and makes up about 75% of the violations I write. This ordinance has many different pieces to it regarding property maintenance but here is one of the key pieces. I'm not going to bore you with all the legal mumbo jumbo, so simply put:


Ordinance 4-193 Property maintenance:

Do not have junk and garbage around your property and cut your grass. This includes your front, side and rear yards including behind your alley fence or garage.

A rather simple but very important ordinance, don't you think?

Simply put, just take care of your property. This ordinance does not cost anything except your time. By not cleaning up around your property, your property is creating a blight on the neighborhood and giving visitors a negative impression of Whiting. You are also reducing the property value of your own property as well as surrounding properties. If you own property in the City of Whiting, regardless of whether it is residential or commercial, it is your responsibility to keep it clean and presentable. Please help keep Whiting a great place to live, work, and play. Do your part so I don't have to do mine.

Mayor Signs National Wildlife Federation Monarch Pledge





Monarch butterflies make one of the world's most epic journeys as they migrate 3,000 miles from their summer homes in the backyards and meadows of the United

States to their wintering grounds in Mexico and California's coast. Unfortunately, Monarch butterfly populations have greatly declined. It is estimated that only one percent of the western population remains while the eastern population has declined by ninety percent. Like bees, birds, bats, and other butterfly species, Monarch butterflies are pollinators. The decline in numbers of pollinators threatens our food supply and the continued existence of pollinators for future generations. Pesticides, loss of habitat, and climate change have all contributed to this decline.

The National Wildlife Federation is urging mayors everywhere to sign a pledge to commit to creating habitats for the Monarchs and other pollinators, and to educate the public about how they can make a difference in their community. After consulting with members of WREN (Whiting-Robertsdale Environmental Neighbors), Mayor Steve Spebar has signed the pledge and identified 5 actions that the city will take. First, the Monarch will be incorporated into Whiting's Earth Day celebration on April 20th when the city will sponsor a native plant giveaway. WREN will also be maintaining the native garden that was installed last summer at the Whiting Library. Plant tags will be added to educate the public about various native plants. WREN will also install native plants at two existing beds in Whiting Park this year. Thousands of native plants have already been planted along the existing rain garden and along the back wall of Whiting Park which will provide habitats for Monarchs and other pollinators.

But the city cannot do it alone. Please commit to making your yard a pollinator haven. You can start by planting milkweed and other pollinator friendly plants.

Birthday Candles Celebrates the Turning of Years on the Marian Theatre Guild Stage

The Marian Theatre Guild's spring production of Noah Haidle's *Birthday Candles* tells the story of Ernestine Ashworth, who at the beginning of the play is seventeen years old. She wonders at that young age if she's wasted her life, lamenting about her insignificance in the universe and vowing to rebel against a life of conformity. The play then takes the audience through a series of Ernestine's birthdays

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throughout her life up until her 101st birthday. We see her life unfold through five generations, and all the celebrations, heartbreaks, and significant moments in between.

The play consists of a small ensemble cast of six actors. **Susan Bobos** leads the ensemble playing the role of Ernestine. The supporting cast includes **Kevin Sherman**, **Olivia Rhodehamel**, **Matthew Seiluns**, **Kira Lisle**, and **Elliot Bibat**. Also in the cast is **Nina Mendoza**, who will be understudying multiple roles.

Directing *Birthday Candles* is MTG newcomer **Morgan McCabe**, an accomplished Chicago theatre artist who attended The Goodman School of Drama and has also worked with various theatre companies such as City Lit, Prop Theatre, Lookingglass, and Steppenwolf.

McCabe started the rehearsal process with the actors doing what is known as "table work", which involves a heavy analysis of the script, multiple readings of different scenes, and discussions about the choices and discoveries that each of the characters make throughout the play. This practice, common in many professional theatre companies, is a refreshing, new approach for the Marian Theatre Guild.

"We do this so that we know what the story is, and we have no questions about the use of language in it," McCabe said, "We dig down and we find the layers that are available and possible. That way we can tell the story to the best of our ability, and that we're all on the same page."

Birthday Candles, a play that is performed in one seamless act, is one that McCabe believes that audiences will resonate with in its universal themes of family, loss, and the dreams we carry throughout the passage of time. It is a play that, she says, has a whole lot of love.



"It's about individuals in families and the life that they live, and I can't imagine that there will be people in the audience that won't find something that resonates, that's familiar," McCabe said, "There's happiness and joy, and a lot of dreaming all those things that make us human. I think that is going to bring people into the story very quickly. I think right away they'll recognize a teenager with aspirations to change the world, and they'll recognize how we get from that point to middle age and old age, and what we carry with us along the way."

Additional production credits include **Dee Jai Halicky** as the production's Stage Manager, **Chuck Kosalko** for Lighting and Set Construction, **Jim Staley** leading Set Construction, **Stephanie Naumoff** and **Kim Duha** for Costume Design, and **Marty Dybel** serving as the show's Production Manager and Set Designer.



Grapes of Wrath

What follows is a true story—well, sort of.
Names and information have been altered in order
not to jeopardize my bingo privileges: although
this happened many years ago, after becoming a
kindergarten dropout, traumatic feelings still return
every so often reminding me of my personal
encounter with the grapes of wrath.

The events described took place in the autumn of 1946 at Sacred Heart School, Room 1, Whiting, Indiana. As a first-grader, I liked school—at least in the beginning. To get to school, my two older brothers and I would cross the Oliver Street alley, cut through a neighbor's yard, hike down Sheridan Avenue, hang a left at 118th Street to the corner of LaPorte Avenue, and run the short distance north to Sacred Heart. Never having attended kindergarten, (that's a whole different story), everything was new and exciting. I especially liked the stuff that went with first grade: books with book covers advertising funeral homes and banks, letter cards, recess, small bottles of milk, cigar boxes, crayons, clay, oil cloths, pencils, and yellow writing paper with super wide lines. I liked reading and learning new words. My lefthanded cursive was nearly illegible, so I took extra care with printing my letters and drawing pictures. I liked art, too.

Back in those ancient times, first and second grades were combined due to limited space, so students shared a single fifty-desk classroom. In charge of these future saints was Sister Bruiser (a nickname that protected surviving alumni from ecclesiastical liability). She was an overpowering figure in yards of black robe and flowing habit, it served to amplify her stature and authority. Fastened to her waist by a braided sash of black nylon, hung a huge rosary. This heavenly anchor of salvation jingled and jangled with her every step. Even after all these years, just thinking about the sound of those celestial chimes, brings on an attack of the cold sweats.

The monarch of Room 1, Sister Bruiser, was one nun you didn't mess with. She had massive hands

that kids more-or-less knew could put their lights out. Without a whole lot of discomfort, Sister could have worn her wristwatch on her thumb. By the second day of school, guys knew the score: Misbehave in Sister Bruiser's class, and you'd never see third grade!

As I said, I liked art. Every Friday afternoon was art time. Once a month, as a special treat, we worked with clay. As part of the art supplies, each kid purchased two square sticks of gray modeling clay. When not in use, the clay was kept in a cigar box. Students had to procure a cigar box along with a piece of oilcloth large enough to cover the desktop. When clay time came, oilcloths would be spread to protect the top surface of 40-year-old, screwed to the floor, battle-scarred desks.

All work in parochial school is tied to religious lessons: art was no exception. After reading the Wedding Feast at Cana to us, Sister instructed us to make something with our clay that related to the beautiful story of Jesus' First Miracle. Sister intended for us to make replicas of the water-filled earthen jars, described in the Scriptures. I, however, full of innocence and eager to impress my new teacher, decided to expand on her idea by making a model of wine-bearing grapes.

Before anyone was allowed to work with their clay, Sister gave the class two Cardinal Rules, which if broken, would incur her wrath:

Rule 1: Do not roll your clay into shapes of marbles or worms.

Rule 2: Do not roll your clay into the cylindrical shape of a hot dog.

From my seat near the back of the room, over by the windows, I set up for clay work. Unfortunately, as a timid 5-year-old first-grader, I knew the fundamental shape of grapes, but no clue how they grew. Bushes? Vines? Trees? Arbitrarily, I selected trees. With arduous fervor, I set to work. From one stick of clay, I rolled about a dozen good sized spheres—grapes grew in bunches—that much I knew. With the remaining clay stick, I formed the trunk of my grape tree. Even in the horizontal position on my oil cloth, I could tell it was a fine trunk of a tree. I definitely had an artist's eye. Things were shaping up nicely. The

other first-graders were fashioning clay jars; I was the only one with a grape tree!

Soon it was time for Sister to check our work. Desk after desk was adorned with clay urns fit for a royal wedding. I listened to her words of praise as she made her way toward my desk. I heard her rosary and swishing robe. Somewhere deep inside my brain, an alarm went off, and an inexplicable feeling of foreboding filled every pore of my body.

When Sister caught sight of my desk, she hit the brakes hard! Before her eyes, like an alien protrusion, my grape tree stood proudly righteously surrounded by a cluster of gray marble -sized grapes. Her eyes widened and took the shape of saucers. In a voice that triggered seismographs in three states, she bellowed: "YOU WERE SUPPOSED TO MAKE A JAR—A CLAY JAR! AND LOOK WHAT YOU'VE DONE!"

Using a doubled-up fist and one powerful steroid -like swing of her sledgehammer arm, Sister Bruiser brought down the wrath of righteousness —with bull's-eye accuracy—upon my work of art. In an instant, she compressed my clay tree to a stump with such force, she smashed the grapes! (Historically, this event is referred to as "Cluster's" last stand.) I, myself, came within an eyelash of being martyred. Miraculously, she came to her senses and realized that my artistic expression was not the work of Satan but blissful angelic ignorance. Even so, as not to give temptation a second chance, she took away my clay, taped my cigar box shut, and locked it in her storage cabinet. All in all, it was a very traumatic experience. For the rest of the year, I remained clay-less.

Of course, I continued to go to school. Even considering an occasional setback, I did quite well. Not only did I successfully complete grade school and earn a high school diploma; I even graduated from college. And that's not too shabby for a kid who had his grapes smashed in first grade.




thing in the world we want is for her to grow up in a shelter.

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Whiting/Robertsdale Crime Watch: 03-14-2024

Terry – Cline Avenue Bridge: Came to go over the drive and save with the community rewards program in case there may have been any questions or concerns about the program. By enrolling in this free program, you can take the Cline Avenue Bridge for an 60% discounted rate. Only 2 axle vehicles with transponder (either an I-Pass or E-ZPass) will qualify. The website to get started is **clineavenuetolls.com/Web/toll discount**. Once your registration is confirmed, the discount starts with your third trip across the bridge. Every 90 days you are required to make two crossings at regular price to maintain program eligibility.

Officers responded but could not locate any offending parties.
